Why Teach Phonics

Synthetic phonics offers the vast majority of young children the best and most direct route to becoming skilled readers and writers"

'What is phonics?

Phonics is...

Knowledge of the alphabetic code.



Skills of segmentation and blending

Children will learn their first 19 phonemes:

Set 1: m a s d t i n p g o c k u r b f e l h z w j v y qu x ck (as in duck) ff (as in puff) ll (as in hill) ss (as in hiss)

Sounds should be articulated clearly and precisely.

Children need to be able to hear the separate sounds in a word and then blend them together to say the whole word.

Segmenting -for writing

Children need to be able to hear a whole word and say every sound that they hear.



How do we teach Phonics

- We follow a phonics scheme of work called Success for All (SFA) phonics
- Every day the children have 10-15 minute sessions of phonics.



Getting ready for phonics

- Tuning into sounds
- Listening and remembering sounds
 - Talking about sounds
 - Music and movement
 - Rhythm and rhyme
 - Sound effects
 - Speaking and listening skills



Key Words

There are many words that **cannot** be blended or segmented because they are irregular and come up frequently when children are reading and writing.


Developing tiny hands






Developing Fine Motor Skills

- Using scissors
- Threading
- Playdough
- Doing their own buttons, zips etc
- Encourage them to write with different pens/pencils/crayons etc






Mark Making/Writing




How you can help

- Set up a regular time to mark make. Give your child a piece of unlined paper and fun markers or crayons. Expect this to last about 5-10 minutes.
- Call it writing. "Let's do some writing today!"
- As your child mark makes, talk about things that are meaningful to them and what they are writing



How you can help

• Write sentences that your child dictates. Read back, pointing to each word, moving left to right on the page. Invite your child to read along with you on subsequent readings. Your child may want to illustrate the page and read it to others




How you can help

- Set up a writing Area and provide many opportunities for your child to use it.
- Model authentic writing by letting your child see you pencil events onto a calendar, write a shopping list, fill
 out forms, and compose thank you notes.



Mark Making/Writing



- **Do not spell every word for your child**. When they have to write their own spellings children must think about letter-sound relationships.
- · Alphabet chart with pictures so your child has a reference for spelling sounds.
- **Teach your child to streeeetch out the words** when spelling them so that he writes each sound that he hears.



- Help your child write for different purposes letters, charts, notes, etc.
- Show your child how to use word charts, simple spelling dictionaries, and other tools to help with spelling.
- Teach conventions of writing (punctuation, capital letters, etc.) as your child is ready



How you can support writing


- Books, books, books!
- Challenge table –
 develop writing for a

- Writing studio books, pens, hole punch, stickers ...
- Clipboards
- Writing on paper, upright writing, cave writing
- Outdoor opportunities
- Reading Mates

Numeracy

For children to be confident, independent mathematicians, the learning environment should be set up to encourage all children to develop independence.

Through initiating their own experiences, children become far more deeply engaged in their play. They will persevere to find out what it is they really want to know or be.







How you can help at home

- Encourage children to select and combine resources from different areas so that they become creative in their use and begin to make vital connections to support their learning.
- Trust!! Adults need to show that they trust children to be able to do challenging things for themselves; to try, fail and try again as they test out skills, ideas, thoughts and feelings in play.
- The use of the learning environment and the activities available need to be carefully balanced. Ensuring a range of opportunities, both adult and child initiated, supports children in developing ideas and learning from each other and also ensures opportunities to choose to engage in more focused adult led activities.
